

Two Questions

Two questions I have recently been asked: 1) what does a vicar actually do? And 2) what is it that St Andrew's actually believes?

Now, I am someone who can suffer from what might be called taxi-cab answers (I think of the better answer on the way home!) so I had to confess to God my feeble response to the first question and now I want to confess to you the response of my second.

This was, of course, an impossible question to answer in any concise way. Yes, there are the creeds. We have our parish statement of inclusivity, welcome and service. We are also a fair trade and eco church. Then under that, there will be a vast array of belief and understanding amongst individuals. For instance, some may have fully worked out the doctrines of trinitarian co-existence, whilst others are fully convinced that their faith is built on practical deeds of goodness and service. Still others may be content to come and enjoy the music and community, or even to worship here despite the tradition or ethos or with more doubt than belief. We all come to God in different ways, from different life-experiences and with different expectations.

But one belief we do have in common is that we are willing to openly confess Christ. Or at least be amongst a people who do. This is what sets apart the ecclesia - the Church - from the world: a people who are willing to discern the movement of God in - not only- their lives but in the life of humanity and of all of creation too.

And held dear to our parish with this common confession of Christ is a belief in the Good News of inclusivity of creativity and hospitality which, I believe, lay ourselves wide open to the work of the Spirit. A church that has as its only points of reference long established "truths" rather than THE Truth, THE Life and THE Way, is dangerously close to becoming static and irrelevant. It is important, especially in the current theological (which is worryingly veering towards binary, introspective preferences), that churches like ours cultivate a FIRM belief that is "open -" as the liberation theologian Gustavo Gutierrez puts it "in the protest against trampled human dignity... in liberating love, and in the building of a new, just, and comradely society - to the gift of the kingdom of God". This is what I believe Jesus showed us in his incarnation, teaching, death and resurrection: that God, in Christ, liberates humanity -"I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" says lesus in John 10:10.

So, I may have got us wrong, and for that I ask for forgiveness! But whether right or wrong, I can say that I am looking forward, with St Andrew's and St Nicholas' to believing, to confessing, to becoming a more Christ-shaped church that is truly inclusive, welcoming and serving, and that never stops being part of the process through which the whole world is transformed.

And maybe you can help me work on the answer to the first question!

The North Wiltshire Symphony Orchestra will give its next concert in St. Andrew's church on **Saturday November 16th at 7.30 p.m.**

In this concert we take a different romantic theme from June with two great Russian works. We hope to see a large audience again for this trio of some of the most famous and popular orchestral pieces.

This concert features soloist **Paul Bosworth**, principal trumpet of the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra. He studied at both Trinity Laban Conservatoire and the Royal Academy of music. After graduating he has worked with the E.U. Baroque orchestra and performed with some of the leading symphony orchestras in Europe.

November Concert Lineup

Tchaikovsky: Romeo & Juliet, Overture-Fantasy

Shakespeare's story of young love is vividly brought to life in this, almost symphonic, work. The three sections contrast first Friar Lawrence with his foreboding of doom. Then there is the battle of Capulets and Montagues and finally a dramatic catastrophe completes this descriptive work.

Tchaikovsky: Symphony No.6 Pathétique

This was Tchaikovsky's last major work, completed just before his death. He did first call it his "Passionate Symphony" and "A riddle to everyone". Early writers thought that meant it's either autobiography or a suicide note, but research suggests that it's neither. Its passionate nature has made it one of the most popular symphonies ever since. The first three movements follow standard forms and have memorable melodies. The "limping waltz" of the second and the playful scherzo of the 3rd are full of playful joy. The finale is the most unusual being both slow and darkly dramatic, dying away to a muted end very different from the usual bold symphonic climaxes.

Hummel: Trumpet Concerto

Hummel bridges the transition from Classical to Romantic composers and technically for the transition from Baroque to modern trumpet. It is thoroughly modern in style giving the soloist many opportunities for virtuoso display in the outer movements. The central, slow movement is, by contrast, both serious and dramatic.

Mothers' Union Update

Oberammergau Passion Play

Rev. Judith Lee gave us a very interesting presentation on the Oberammergau Passion Play. She began by explaining that the play was first performed in 1634 when an outbreak of bubonic plague devasted Bavaria during the Thirty Years War (1618-1648). Initially, Oberammergau managed to remain plague free by forbidding any movement into or out of the village. However, on 25th September 1633, a man named Kasper Schisler managed to return home after working in a neighbouring village. Needless to say, he brought the disease with him! Over the next 33 days, 81 villagers would die, half of Oberammergau's population. On 28th October 1633, the villagers vowed that if God spared them from the plague, they would perform a play every 10 years depicting the life and death of Jesus. Nobody died of the plague in Oberammergau after that vow, and the villagers have kept their word to God, performing the play for the first time in 1634 and then every 10 years till 1674 and each decadal year since 1680, with just a few exceptions.

Judith explained that the text of the play is a composite of four distinct manuscripts dating from the 15th and 16th centuries, performed on open-air stages in the village over a period of about 5 hours. It involves over 2,000 people: actors, musicians, stage technicians, and others, all residents of the village, whose total population today is just over 5,000. The play comprises spoken dramatic text, musical and choral accompaniment and tableau vivants, which are scenes from the Old Testament depicted for the audience by motionless actors accompanied by verbal description. Judith provided a CD of some of the music and a large number of slides to illustrate her talk, which made it a very entertaining afternoon.
